Suffering by Faith
from Ben Waldner

Since the fateful day that Adam decided to disobey God, sorrow and suffering has been the experience for Adam and his descendants (Gen. 3:16-19). While most people (myself included) seek to bypass all sorrow, Jesus reminded his disciples that in this world they would have tribulation (John 16:33). Since Jesus miraculously healed many people and relieved their suffering, He is for alleviating pain, distress, and sorrow. However, in this world, not all pain, distress, and sorrow will be avoided. In other words, no matter how determined we are to avoid all sorrow and suffering, according to Jesus, it is a losing battle. Since Jesus only tells us what is true, it is best to accept that reality and learn how to live in a manner pleasing to him in the midst of suffering. Three Bible characters that serve as examples in suffering are Moses, Paul, and Peter.

In our first example, the Bible says that Moses "chose to suffer affliction with the people of God" (Heb. 11:25). From this world's value system, Moses had it all. He was educated, had position (and influence), physical strength, and wealth. But he esteemed something else of greater value than these. Moses' valued ridicule for the sake of Christ above all the wealth of Egypt (Heb. 11:16). How did Moses see so far into the future to behold Christ, and even further yet to the eternal reward? By faith in the invisible One who makes and fulfills promises (Heb. 11:23, 24, 27, 28).

In our second example, Saul (later known as Paul) also had much going for

him. His list of qualifications (Philippians 3:5-6) placed him in position to give the valedictorian address. His resume may have caught the attention modern terrorist recruits. He was zealous to the degree that "Saul" and "havoc" was synonymous to believers in the early church. But something happened to Saul. On the way to Damascus, there was a bright light, a brief conversation, instruction what to do, and then dark silence for



3 days. By his own admission, Paul later writes, "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ" (Phil. 3:7). (Savor the next sentence in his letter). "Yea, doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ" (3:8). Personal merit went to the dung pile and the pursuit of Christ (with suffering) would

Counselor’s Thoughts

From the Desk of Tom Johnson



The 2020 Helping People in Need seminar is now history. Hopefully, the content of that seminar will have left lasting impressions in the minds of all who attended. It did for me. One thing that was impressed upon me was the fact that all Christian churches, Anabaptist churches in particular, need to take the reality of abuse seriously. Church-based discipleship ministries like Fresh Start Training Center and Deeper Life Ministries cannot escape that reality. The presence of the problem is starkly obvious to them because that is what they exist to help with. But a poignant point made that week was that all groups of Jesus’ followers need to make sure they don’t “put their heads in the sand” by thinking “That can’t happen here.” This is a real problem, involving real people. Fortunately, the trend toward ignorance, either in realizing the presence of the problem, or in how to deal with it, can be changed. God provides real solutions by giving us methods and resources. He designed the church to be a place where people can equip and help each other resist their tendency toward sinful thinking and behavior. He gave us the tools and His own Spirit to give direction and hope in living lives free from abuse. 🙏

be Paul’s life. How did Paul come to the place of solely depending on Christ for righteousness? By faith in Christ who is the ultimate fulfillment of God’s promises (Phil. 3:9).

Our third and final example is Peter. A fisherman by trade, Peter worked the late shift on the unpredictable Sea of Galilee, which was not for those easily given to vertigo, fear, or impatience. Lacking educational acumen may have contributed to his inquisitiveness and speaking out of turn. After all, if something needs to be said, why not say it? Peter’s view of suffering comes from an eye witness—one that saw the suffering (1 Peter 5:1). He was part of the small group in the Garden when Jesus prayed in agony, and may have been among His acquaintances at the crucifixion (Luke 23:49). In the process of restoring Peter after denying Him thrice, Jesus prophetically informed Peter of the manner of his death, and then simply stated, “follow me” (John 21:19). And follow he did. He went to prison (Acts 5:18; 12:2), was beaten, and rejoiced that he was counted worthy to suffer shame for his name (Acts 5:40-41). How did Peter come to the point of rejoicing in suffering for Christ? He saw suffering first-hand and embraced it personally.

Moses saw the suffering Savior in the future by faith and chose to identify with him. Paul saw what the Savior had accomplished in the past by faith and identified with him as well. Peter saw suffering first-hand and accepted Jesus’ invitation to follow Him through suffering. 🙏

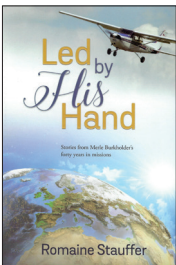

Paperback, 282 pages, 16-page color photo section. \$11.99

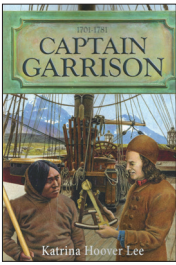

Katrina Hoover Lee | Paperback, 382 pages, \$12.49

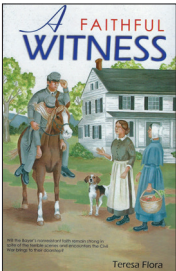

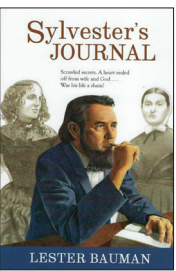

Lester Bauman | PaperPaperback, 244 pages, \$11.99

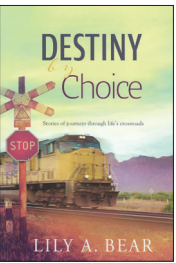

Eva Zimmerman | Hardcover, 31 pages, \$6.99

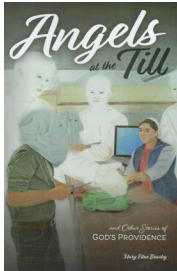

LEARNING FAMILIES

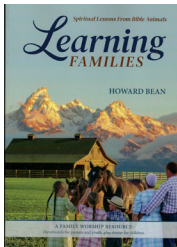
Howard Bean | Paperback, 360 pages, \$10.99

Family worship is a time for parents and children to gather for singing, Bible reading, and spiritual instruction. Many parents see the importance of family worship, but struggle to find material suitable for their whole family.

Learning Families is part of a series of devotional books that addresses that need. Each of the thirteen sections in this book focuses on animals from the Bible, including cows, horses, birds, and ants. Each section has readings for seven days, making ninety-one lessons - enough for a quarter of a year.

Each-day’s-lesson-consists-of-two-parts-The first part is especially for Mom and Dad and older children. It includes a suggested Scripture reading, a theme verse, and a devotional meditation on the topic introduced by the Scripture reading.

The second part consists of a reading from a continued children’s story related to that week’s theme. Each story is followed by questions for review and discussion, which provide opportunities for applying the theme to life.

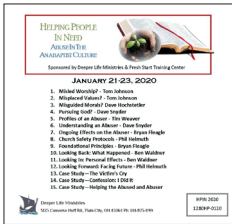
