Mending Relationships

Suppose someone makes an unkind or belittling remark about you, and you have been hurt—now what? Your attitude about that person will affect how you handle those remarks or offenses. That in turn will affect your relationship with that person.

When our relationships are healthy, we can absorb almost anything. But when our relationships are strained, insignificant remarks can sometimes begin to bog us down. Resurrecting previous hurts and grudges seem to happen by default and adds stress to our relationships. Erecting pious veneers seems easier than seeking to restore them by honesty, transparency, and humility.

Our relationship with God is foundational to having a good attitude about others, which affects our relationship with them. Being at peace with God gives a basis for peace in our relationships with other people. Additionally, this peace with God is also the means by which peace can be restored with others. We then can do what the Apostle Paul said, "Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive" (Col. 3:13).

Broken relationships are difficult to mend. Fractures in relationships tend to go from bad to worse because few are willing to invest the time and effort to talk things out. Those who endeavor to rebuild relationships are not undertaking a simple or easy task. Interpersonal conflicts can get messy. Talking about differences can get complicated. Allowing yourself to be affected by other people's experiences

will likely stir unpleasant emotions. Empathizing with others and attempting to help them involves risk.

If you are one of those persons that wants to help mend broken relationships, what are some barriers you might encounter as you to attempt to help others? Following are several you may encounter.

One barrier is bitterness. Bitterness is the seed of resentment planted in the soil of the heart, unperceptively and pervasively spreading its noxious influence. It is notorious for producing large quantities of bad fruit, namely spiritual blindness. Once established, it is difficult to uproot. Even though you may not be the one they are bitter toward, it will affect how they hear what you have to say. You need make sure you do not take this personally.

A second barrier is broken trust. Physical, sexual, or verbal abuse from an authority figure, parent, or close relative violates an implicit trust. Violations of this nature are both painful and shameful. Barriers are commonly erected to safeguard against further violations, affecting subsequent relationships. You may encounter significant resistance in your effort to establish trust with the person you are helping.

A third barrier is misunderstanding. When the basic human desire to be understood goes unfulfilled in one relationship, people may seek understanding from another. For example, if a wife seeks understanding from her husband in relation to her tiredness, but does not receive it, she may find it in another man. Or, a husband may seek understanding about work

From the Desk of Ben Waldner



After David and his 600 men were disinvited from ioining the Philistines in an attack on their fellow-Israelites, they returned to their town to find their families

captured and their homes destroyed (1 Sam. 30). In deep anguish, these men wept themselves to exhaustion. Their wives and children were gone, and they didn't know when or if they would see them again. All their possessions were taken as well. The place they called home was burned with fire. This was a bitter experience. Adding distress to injury, David's men talked of stoning him. Having his personal distress to contend with, and being overwhelmingly outnumbered, the Bible records the following words: "But David encouraged himself in the Lord his God."

Whenever I read this account. I am instructed by David's example. He was a man that was deeply affected by tragedy. David likely wept alongside his companions, for this was a grave sorrow. However, one quality that distinguished him from his men was that he found strength in the LORD. In contrast to his followers who looked for someone to harm, David turned to God for help. Instead of arguing with his men how unreasonable and unfair they were, David sought direction from his God. stresses from his wife, but having not received it, may seek it from a coworker. As a helper, it is important that you not get lost in the details of their situation, and fail to address the heart of the matter. This hinders you from really understanding them.

As a person that wants to help mend broken relationships, consider these two helps to apply to that process.

Practice intentionally listening. Take the time to listen to the person, allowing the person to communicate their thoughts, feelings, and perspective. This can be an effective way of demonstrating compassion. understanding, and concern. Listening is vital for understanding the particulars of a person's circumstances and for speaking intelligently into his or her life.

Encourage personal responsibility. This is especially relevant for those who tend to shirk or procrastinate in their responsibilities. Encourage them to practice self-evaluation, remove the log out of their own eye, confess their sins, seek forgiveness, and pray for their strained relationship. Encouraging your friend to focus on his relationship with God first can embolden, comfort, and give fresh hope to him in restoring peace.
