What do you NEED?



As people, we are designed to require certain things to maintain life. The easiest ones to identify are physical needs such as air, water, food, clothing and shelter. Beyond that there are other, more difficult things to define as needs. A difficulty we have as humans is the tendency to confuse desires for needs. It permeates the societies we live in. It is so prevalent that it has become commonplace to understand the problems we face and the things we reach for to solve those problems as a result of unmet needs. We have coined this the "Needs Theory." Following are two primary ways it shows up in our attempts to understand and address problems.

First, suppose a person grows up missing something important in his relationship with one or more family members. That lack in his life could likely impact him in significant ways. But, the Needs Theory would put emphasis on that unmet need, and then either point to Jesus or someone or something as the way to get that need fulfilled. This sounds good, but notice the emphasis is upon the unfulfilled need. By implication, that need is considered to be something vital, without which life (spiritual, emotional, relational, etc.) cannot continue. That then puts the substitute provider of

that need in the place of becoming an idol to the needy person.

Second, the Needs Theory suggests that various commands in the Bible to love, respect, obey, submit etc. are there to satisfy the "needs" others have for those same things. It implies that the fact that God commands them proves that they are a legitimate need. People are then counseled to provide those things for others so that the others will be motivated to provide them in return. The problem with this thinking is that in essence it removes God from the picture except to say that God created everyone with certain "needs." After that it is essentially a "you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours" situation, and again puts others in the place of being idols. They, as a result, tend to be controlled and manipulated to provide what is "needed." This approach offers no solution to situations where people are unwilling or unable to reciprocate. In other words, there are two simple problems with the Needs Theory. One is considering certain desires to be essential for life. The other is looking to the wrong sources to supply those things. The things we provide for others should not be connected with what they can or

should provide for us. We should love others because God loves us, and commands us to love them. This does not depend on whether or not we receive anything back from them. If we expect our “need” to be met by people, then we make those people bigger than God. This then hinders our ability to love them and receive God’s help.

Living in a fallen world subjects us to less than ideal circumstances that may or may not change. God does not guarantee that any of our perceived needs will be fulfilled in this life “And all these, having obtained a good testimony through faith, did not receive the promise” (Heb 11:39). He does, however, guarantee grace, strength and wisdom to endure difficult circumstances. “...My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness...” (2 Cor. 12:9). Our peace rests on our love for God, our obedience to do what He says to do, and our trust in Him. Freedom comes from surrendering the unfulfilled “need” to God, letting it go, and thriving in the circumstances He gives us.

Julie Lowe \$23.49



Christopher Ash \$9.99






UNTANGLING EMOTIONS




